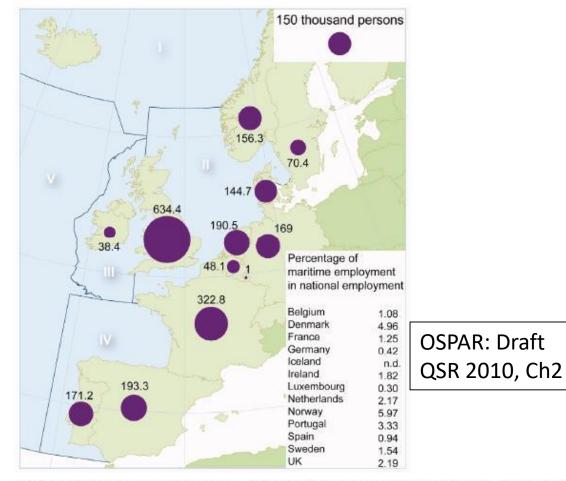


Figure 2.1: Employment in all sea-related areas for the EU and Norway. Source: Policy Research Corporation, EU maritime clusters study 2008.

 - EU and domestic
- Extensive experience of working with legislation and regulators
 - Interpretation
 - Implementation

Environmental Legislation:



- No legislation is not an option
- We are still interpreting EU Directives and M and CAA
- Defra's 25 year environment programme
 - Does existing legislation meet the objectives
- New legislation would be challenging and time consuming
 - Is it high on UK Government's agenda?

Future Targets



- Will targets stay the same?
 - Defra Secretary Of State committed to improving the environment
 - Would change continue to deliver sustainable development
 - Are there better socio-economic targets to parallel environmental targets?

The Way Ahead



- New legislation takes a long time
 - Expensive
 - Extensive consultation
 - Not high on UK Government agenda
- Existing legislation
 - Greater certainty based on experience
 - EU law may need adapting to UK needs

Opportunities



- Clarify those aspects still unclear
 - Socio-economic
 - Cumulative impact

- UK context for Habitats and Birds Directives
 - Alternatives and IROPI may need to reflect UK policy objectives
