What is inshore fishing?

"Geographically and politically, for the purposes of management, the area defined as inshore extends to 6nm from land, but fixed definitions of what the inshore is are not helpful. The 6nm does not contain the limits of the inshore fishery, nor does it limit the access of the offshore fishery to the inshore." (Scottish Fishermen's Federation, Inshore Fisheries Policy Brexit and beyond, 2019)

"The term 'inshore' is something of a misnomer. We use it here as shorthand for fishing boats which are typically under-10m that work close to shore, mainly in pursuit of shellfish, and do not own Fixed Quota Allocation units. Larger vessels catching quota species and designed to operate well offshore can and do fish in inshore waters from time to time." (Shetland Fishermen's Association, Rebuilding Scotland's Inshore Fisheries, 2019)



So what's the problem?

Criticisms of current management approach:

- Unnecessary complexity
- Lacking consistency
- Does not deliver sustainability goals
- Ignores interdependence between 'inshore' and 'offshore'



A need for change

Previous attempts to address issues have suffered from:

- Lack of stakeholder support
- Resource constraints
- Changes in political climate and/or priorities

See Sustainable Access to Inshore Fisheries (SAIF) Recommendations for Reform of the English Inshore Fishing Fleet 2010.



Why now?

EU Exit provides an opportunity to change our approach.

There is both a desire for change and the will to make it happen.

There is a growing culture of collaboration.



What will we do?

Steering Group comprising industry, Government and research community.

Establish a Blueprint for the future management of inshore fisheries management regime that is truly sustainable.

Long-term project, it will take time to foster and implement change.

This is not about finding a 'one-size fits all' solution.

- 'Issues and Ideas' Workshop:
 - 50 participants
 - 5 core themes
- Workshop report published
