



























Protecting the prawn fishery – is it worth the cost?

Conclusions

- Mud habitats and fisheries in the Irish Sea are under intense pressure
- We are protecting unsustainable and damaging fisheries at the price of fish stocks and the marine environment
- Significant political will and drastic changes in setting quotas and management are required
- Or will 'chokes' be the last resort that give whitefish fisheries a chance to breathe?
- Designating protected areas will help to kick-start recovery and are unlikely to a significant impact on prawn fisheries
